



Highlights of Legislation 2023 Regular Session

All bills referenced in this document became law.

ACCOUNTABILITY, EFFICIENCY AND TRANSPARENCY

Senate Bill 2053 the Deficit Prevention Act requires state agencies to notify certain officials when likelihood of a deficit exists.

Senate Bill 2538 is a preneed disaster bill that allows counties and municipalities to opt in to a list of pre-approved vendors before a natural disaster occurs so FEMA will reimburse local governments for cleanup costs in the event a disaster happens.

AGRICULTURE

Senate Bill 2523 creates a \$100 fine or 30 days in jail for persons who violate the law of picking up pecans in public rights of way, shaking from limbs or removing from limbs. It also provides cause for conviction of larceny, any taking of pecans from private property without permission and subjects persons to civil reimbursement of property owner.

APPORTIONMENT AND ELECTIONS

House Bill 1310 authorizes the Secretary of State to audit election procedures of the 2023, 2024, 2026 and 2027 elections. During the procedural audit, the Secretary of State shall audit the following:

- Procedures for testing of OMR equipment before counting ballots;
- Ballot accounting reports, seal logs, poll books, and receipt books;
- Absentee ballots, absentee ballot applications, and absentee ballot envelopes, along with the list provided to the resolution board; and
- Affidavit ballots and affidavit ballot envelopes, including affidavit ballot receipt books.

The Secretary of State shall create a post-election audit manual which will detail the policies and procedures for conducting post-election audits, and will not be allowed to alter it 90 days before the election. The Secretary of State shall also compile a report of the procedural audits not later than 120 days after the election and present it to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House and Chairs of the House and Senate Election Committees along with comments on the report from local election officials.

- Section 23-15-613, which provides that election commissions and county and municipal executive committees shall report residual vote information to the Secretary of State, is repealed.
- The bill also amends Section 23-15-153 to authorize election commissioners to receive a per diem of \$110 for conducting an audit of an election.
- Section 23-15-5 is amended to revise how the monies in the Elections Support Fund are distributed by removing the provision that 70% goes to the counties and 30% goes to the State General Fund and providing instead that all of the money in the special fund shall be distributed annually to the counties. The section is also amended to require counties to ensure that all computers with access to the Statewide Elections Management System be equipped with

appropriate security measures, and to provide that the money in the special fund may be used to purchase such security measures.

- The bill creates Section 23-15-152 to provide that an elector who fails to respond to a confirmation notice or update his or her voter registration and who fails to vote during a certain period of time shall be removed from the Statewide Elections Management System.

- ▶ The section provides what a confirmation notice is and who will receive a confirmation notice.

- ▶ A registered voter who is mailed a confirmation notice shall be placed on inactive status in the Statewide Elections Management System but shall be able to vote by affidavit ballot.

- ▶ A registered voter fails to respond to the confirmation notice if the voter, during a period beginning on the date the confirmation notice was sent and ending on the day after the date of the second general election for federal office that occurs after the date of the notice, fails to respond to the confirmation notice or update the elector's registration information.

- ◆ However, if a voter fails to respond to the confirmation notice but votes at least once in any election in the registered voter's county or municipality during the period of time after the confirmation notice was sent, he or she will not be purged from the Statewide Elections Management System.

- ◆ Additionally, a registered voter who is active or reserve military or who serves on jury duty or responds to a summons for jury duty will not be purged from the Statewide Elections Management System.

- ▶ No systematic list maintenance shall occur during the 90 days immediately preceding a federal primary or general election which is limited to moving a voter to inactive status or purged status.

- ▶ The county registrar shall retain purged voter registration records after they are purged for a period that includes at least two federal general elections and shall record the reason for the removal.

- ▶ Section 23-15-125 is amended to conform to the provisions in newly created Section 23-15-152.

- Section 23-15-15 is amended to provide that by January 1, 2025, the Secretary of State shall compare the entire Statewide Election Management System to the Department of Public Safety Driver's License Database and follow the procedures in place if a voter is flagged in the database as a potential noncitizen. This section also provides that all documentation provided to show proof of citizenship shall be exempt from the Mississippi Public Records Act.

- ▶ Section 23-15-165 is amended to conform to the changes in Section 23-15-15.

Senate Bill 2353 increases salaries for poll workers, ballot carriers and poll managers.

Senate Bill 2358 provides that a person shall not knowingly collect and transmit a ballot that was mailed to another person, except as follows:

- An election official while engaged in official duties as authorized by law.
- An employee of the United States Postal Service while engaged in official duties as authorized by law.
- Any other individual who is allowed by federal law to collect and transmit United States mail while engaged in official duties as authorized by law.

- A family member, household member, or caregiver of the person to whom the ballot was mailed.
 - A common carrier that transports goods from one place to another for a fee. No parcel shall contain more than a single ballot.
- Any violation of this act shall be subject to the penalties of Section 97-13-37.

APPROPRIATIONS

House Bill 602 increases the office operating allowance for district attorneys for the necessary expenses of operating the office of the district attorney from \$35,000 to \$50,000 for each district.

House Bill 603 is the transfer bill that contains money for projects in districts statewide.

Senate Bill 2372 establishes the Mississippi Hospital Sustainability Grant Program for the purpose of strengthening, improving and preserving access to hospital care services for all Mississippians and in recognition of the challenges incurred by hospitals as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

DRUG POLICY

House Bill 722 excludes fentanyl testing materials from definition of "paraphernalia."

House Bill 231 directs Department of Mental Health to develop fentanyl education and drug abuse prevention and cessation program.

House Bill 1158 revises certain provisions of the Medical Cannabis Act.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

House Bill 549 exempts certain businesses from paying sales tax on property transported from Mississippi and first used in another state.

House Bill 1723 authorizes up to \$1 million in tax credits for certain organizations supporting community food pantries or soup kitchens.

Senate Bill 2449 amends existing law to allow taxation of certain computer software. "Sales of computer software, computer software services, specified digital products, or other products delivered electronically, including, but not limited to, music, games, reading materials or ring tones, shall be taxed as provided in other sections of this chapter."

Senate Bill 2810 in part, revises the authority of the Office of Workforce Development.

[Senate Bill 2858](#) amends section 57-115-5, Mississippi Code of 1972, “to increase by \$45 million, the aggregate amount of investment tax credits that may be allocated to participating investors of Mississippi small business investment companies under the Mississippi Small Business Investment Company Act; To provide the taxable years in which participating investors may claim the additional credits so allocated against their premium tax liability, and for related purposes.”

[Senate Bill 2892](#) authorizes the City of Vicksburg to create, develop and promote for tourism/economic development, the Dr. Jane McAllister Museum, commemorating the accomplishments of the first African American woman to earn a doctorate degree.

[Senate Bill 3108](#) allows Lowndes County officials to lease 65-acres to the Palmer Home for Children for nonprofit use for the benefit of disadvantaged children.

EDUCATION

[*House Bill 817](#) increases the minimum funding level for Early Learning Collaboratives to \$2,500 for full-day and \$1,250 for half-day programs.

[House Bill 1173](#) allows charter school teachers to receive classroom supply procurement cards from the Education Enhancement Funds.

[*House Bill 1264](#) authorizes school districts to provide feminine hygiene products for female students in Grades 6-12 at no cost to the students.

[House Bill 1613](#) contains the \$3.14 billion K-12 education budget, which includes an increase of \$104,038,546, over the previous year.

[Senate Bill 2079](#) creates the Mississippi School Safety Guardian Act, that allows well trained school employees to carry and use a concealed firearm to protect students and staff as a first line of defense in the event of an active shooter on campus.

[Senate Bill 2749](#) allows school board members to receive salary increases based on district population.

ENERGY

[House Bill 698](#) ensures cities and counties charge only for actual usage of water and sewer services and cannot charge based on sizes or values of dwellings. Some, whom, have successfully used a version of the formula, will be grandfathered in.

[House Bill 1225](#) transfers duty and enforcement of the Mississippi Telephone Solicitation Act to Attorney General's Office.

FORESTRY

Senate Bill 2525 creates the Mississippi "Forestry Facility Grant Program," that puts aside \$10 million in incentive money for forestry related businesses to expand existing businesses and offer incentives for startups to develop.

GAMING

House Bill 606 creates the Mobile/Online Betting Task Force.

INSURANCE

Senate Bill 2615 allows contract employees to purchase base plan of the State and School Employees' Health Insurance Plan.

Senate Bill 2228 allows the sale of pet health insurance policies.

House Bill 521 establishes the "Length of Service Award Program," to assist with recruitment and retention of volunteer firefighters.

JUDICIARY A

House Bill 1318 amends existing "Baby Drop-off laws" by extending the time a parent has to surrender the baby to an emergency provider to 45 days after birth. The bill authorizes newborn safety devices at emergency locations like fire departments and hospitals. The bill also allows parents an option to call 911 and surrender the baby within 45 days from birth.

Senate Bill 2073 lowers age of majority to 18 for securing loans and purchasing real property.

Senate Bill 2082 administratively suspends child support obligations for incarcerated individuals.

Senate Bill 2382 requires out of state lawyers who are not licensed to practice law in Mississippi and advertise on television and billboards to disclose that they are not licensed to practice in Mississippi.

Senate Bill 2652 creates the Mississippi Vulnerable Person Abuse Registry that will contain the names of persons convicted of abuse, neglect or exploitation.

JUDICIARY B

House Bill 405 extends the length of time for prosecution of the crime of bribery of a candidate to five years.

[House Bill 1110](#) creates the Second Amendment Financial Privacy Act which restricts the use of “firearms codes” in gathering information related to purchases of weapons or related accessories.

[House Bill 1315](#) prohibits pornographic online and digital/resources for K-12 students.

[Senate Bill 2127](#) allows prosecutors to criminally charge and prosecute persons who make terroristic threats, especially bomb threats. Under current law, a person who makes such a threat must ask or demand something to be prosecuted. The amended law would allow charges to be filed for uttering the threat

CRIMINAL JUSTICE SYSTEM

[House Bill 485](#) establishes a firm timeline for law enforcement processing and handling of sexual assault evidence kits.

[House Bill 795](#) revises how the fines for the crime of shoplifting are calculated. It also requires that fines be based on total price of all shoplifted items.

[House Bill 912](#) provides that a firearm suppressor manufactured and remaining in the State of Mississippi is not subject to federal laws and regulations governing firearm suppressors.

[House Bill 1020](#) establishes the structure of the Capitol Complex Improvement District inferior court, and establishes expanded boundaries for Capitol Police patrols, in part.

[Senate Bill 2101](#) increases the maximum term of imprisonment for the crime of fleeing or eluding a law enforcement officer in a motor vehicle from five years to 10 years when done in a manner manifesting extreme indifference to the value of human life.

[Senate Bill 2199](#) amends Section 19-23-13 to clarify that a county prosecuting attorney may defend any person in any criminal prosecution as long as the case is not heard within the county in which he or she is the county prosecuting attorney.

[Senate Bill 2239](#) allows state troopers to work after hour security jobs wearing their uniforms and duty weapons while driving their state issued vehicles.

[Senate Bill 2298](#) amends Sections 21-23-8 and 99-5-11 to conform the procedures for setting bail in municipal and justice courts throughout the state.

[Senate Bill 2343](#) further defines jurisdiction of Capitol Police among other things, like certain operational procedures. Passage of Senate Bill 3012 appropriates \$248.45 million to the Department of Public Safety which, in addition to funding the Highway Patrol, sets out full funding for 160 positions with the Capitol Police Department. The Chief of the Capitol Police, the Chief of the Jackson Police Department, and the Sheriff of Hinds County shall hold a regular meeting within the boundaries of the Capitol Complex Improvement District to address the concerns of the public. Also, the Chief of the Capitol Police or the Commissioner of the

Department of Public Safety requires a written approval before any event occurs within the Capitol Complex Improvement District which will take place on any street or sidewalk immediately adjacent to any building or property owned or occupied by the State of Mississippi. Last, the Department of Public Safety to charge the Department of Agriculture a commensurate fee for security services provided for special events at the Mississippi State Fairgrounds Complex.

[Senate Bill 2420](#) directs the Department of Public Safety to create an online public registry of offenders whose crimes involved the embezzlement or misappropriation of public funds. The registry must include the offender's full legal name, any aliases by which the offender is or has been known, including any online or Internet identifiers and the offender's date of birth.

[Senate Bill 2495](#) amends Section 47-5-909 by increasing the standard rate at which the Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC) is required to pay counties for housing state offenders.

[Senate Bill 2551](#) allows Department of Marine Resources Office of Marine Patrol to cooperate with federal law enforcement officers and enforce “all laws of the State of Mississippi, inclusive of all federal laws within the jurisdiction of the State of Mississippi and waters and resources under management of the state.”

[Senate Bill 2634](#) authorizes criminal charges against a parent who willfully neglects or refuses to provide for the support or maintenance of his or her children while the children are under 21 years of age. Previously, Section 97-5-3 had provided for charges where the children were under 18 years of age.

MARINE RESOURCES

[Senate Bill 2530](#) authorizes Department of Marine Resources to designate "Secretary of State Eric Clark Coastal Preserve" and "Gollott Island/Godfather Point”.

[Senate Bill 2544](#) revises Department of Marine Resources authority regarding regulation of oyster beds and water bottoms.

MILITARY AFFAIRS

[Senate Bill 2187](#) allows Mississippi disabled veterans who suffer 70-percent or greater service-related disability to purchase two automobile tags and one motorcycle tag for \$1 each.

MEDICAID

[Senate Bill 2212](#) extends postpartum coverage for Medicaid recipients up to 12 months.

MUNICIPALITIES

[Senate Bill 2306](#) revises number of directors for certain municipalities with a population over 100,000 with a flood and drainage control district which has been enlarged under section 51-35-315.

PUBLIC HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

[House Bill 271](#) provides \$103 million for the Hospital Sustainability Grant Program to assist hospitals in need of supplemental funding.

[House Bill 1125](#) is the Regulate Experimental Adolescent Procedures (REAP) Act which prohibits gender-affirming care for persons under 18 years of age. It also prohibits the use of public money for gender reassignment.

[House Bill 1222](#) creates the “Mississippi Collaborative Response to Mental Health Act,” that will provide mental health training to county and municipal law enforcement officers to reduce deadly encounters between police and persons who may suffer mental illnesses.

[Senate Bill 2323](#) allows community hospitals to partner with one another and consolidate or collaborate to survive difficult financial times.

[Senate Bill 2444](#) establishes a second round of \$74 million in funding for eligible counties and municipalities from the "Mississippi Municipality and County Water Infrastructure Grant Program Act of 2022."

[Senate Bill 2696](#) increases from \$5,000 to \$7,500 the state income tax credit for qualified adoption expenses of persons adopting a child from within the Mississippi foster care system.

[Senate Bill 2781](#) creates The Mississippi Access to Maternal Assistance Program within the Department of Health “to coordinate and promote information and services related to pregnancy, childbirth, and care for dependent children for expectant mothers and new parents. The Program shall include, but shall not be limited to, providing comprehensive information and resources related to adoption assistance, childcare, domestic abuse protection, early intervention, food, clothing, and supplies related to pregnancy and newborn care, job training and placement, paternity, parenting skills, and prenatal and postpartum care.”

[Senate Bill 3113](#) appropriates \$18 million to Office of Workforce Development for certain programs, of which \$15 million will go to “Accelerate Mississippi Workforce Development Program created in House Bill No. 1006, 2022 Regular Session, and “American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Nurse/Allied Health Workforce Development and Retention Act created in Senate Bill No 2371, 2023 Regular Session.” The other \$3 million will go to “the Accelerate Mississippi

Physician Residency and Fellowship Start-Up Grant Program created in Senate Bill No. 2371, 2023 Regular Session.”

PUBLIC PROPERTY

Senate Bill 2203 authorizes the Department of Finance and Administration to assign property in Rankin County for construction of a new Veterans Nursing Home, a counter measure warehouse for Mississippi State Department of Health and land for several other state agencies to build upon.

PUBLIC UTILITIES

Senate Bill 2433 allows citizens to disengage from water distribution and provision services of a municipality.

RULES (HOUSE RESOLUTIONS)

HR 43 Cardiovascular risk reduction; recognize need for thorough screening and treatment of metabolic syndrome.

HR 191 Dr. Cindy Ayers Elliott; commend for being named USA Today's 2023 Woman of the Year Honoree for Mississippi.

TECHNOLOGY

Senate Bill 2140 creates the National Security on State Devices and Networks Act, which defines prohibited technology usage on state issued devices, among other things.

TOURISM

***House Bill 704** provides incentives for television series production to occur. Production companies spending at least \$50,000 will be eligible for a rebate on a portion of expenses.

House Bill 1027 designates the blueberry (*Vaccinium corymbosum*, *Vaccinium virgatum*, or *Vaccinium darrowii*) as the state fruit of Mississippi.

Senate Bill 2137 designates each April as "Mississippi Native Plant Month" in order to preserve the heritage and the importance of native plants for clean air, water and soil stability in the State of Mississippi. During the month of April, the Mississippi Department of Agriculture and Commerce will urge all citizens to educate themselves about the importance and history of Mississippi's native plants and the many benefits they provide to pollinators and to preserve

Mississippi's biological heritage in aiding in the prevention of flooding and erosion and maintaining and preserving the health of Mississippi's economy and environment.

[Senate Bill 2138](#) designates the Mississippi Opal as the state gemstone.

[Senate Bill 2359](#) allows Mississippi Development Authority to issue grants for revitalization of downtown communities through the Mississippi Main Street Revitalization Grant Program.

TRANSPORTATION

[House Bill 1003](#) establishes the Mississippi Fully Autonomous Vehicle Enabling (MS FAVE) Act of 2023 to regulate operation of autonomous vehicles (no human drivers) on public roads.

[Senate Bill 2559](#) deletes the repeal dates regarding the provisions of law that regulate harvest permit authorizations and fees. It creates the Strategic Multi-Modal Investments Fund for the purpose of increasing the capacity for the movement of freight and increasing economic activity at the airports, ports and railroads located in this state and to support long-term economic growth in Mississippi. The fund shall be administered by and under the direction of the Mississippi Department of Transportation. Also, it creates a Strategic Multi-Modal Investments Advisory Board that will advise the Department of Transportation regarding expenditures of the fund. Money in the fund shall be utilized by the department, with the advice of the Strategic Multi-Modal Investments Advisory Board, to provide funding for necessary investments and repairs to airports, ports, and rail lines in this state, as determined by a majority vote of the Mississippi Transportation Commission. The department shall also ensure an equitable share of funding for projects serving rural areas of the state. Lastly, the department shall promulgate rules and regulations necessary for the allocation and implementation of the Strategic Multi-Modal Investments Fund.

[Senate Bill 2562](#) allows public and private partnerships to establish electric vehicle charging stations and allows the Mississippi Transportation Commission to provide grants to private companies to provide the charging stations.

[Senate Bill 2853](#) creates a new section within Chapter 7, Title 31, Mississippi Code of 1972, to require that, beginning January 1, 2025, state agencies and political subdivisions may only purchase small unmanned aircraft systems, or drones, which are manufactured in the United States by an American company and which possess certain collision avoidance systems. Further, the bill grants a 10% bid preference in public procurement for such drones to Mississippi manufacturers and servicing companies. Also, it prohibits state agencies from purchasing or operating drones manufactured or assembled from parts manufactured in the People's Republic of China.

UNIVERSITIES AND COLLEGES

[Senate Bill 2373](#) creates the Skilled Nursing Home and Hospital Nurses Retention Loan Repayment Program, which in part may pay licensed practical nurses and licensed registered nurses a \$6,000 per year bonus for up to three years, with which to pay student loan debt for working “at an acute care hospital or skilled nursing home.”

[Senate Bill 2487](#) establishes the Mississippi Dual Enrollment/Dual Credit Scholarship Program. The Mississippi Postsecondary Education Financial Assistance Board will “set the dates and deadlines for applying for funding for dual enrollment/dual credit courses of eligible Mississippi high school students... and award scholarships to participating institutions for those who meet the eligibility requirements.”

WAYS AND MEANS

[House Bill 1168](#) amends Section 27-65-241, which authorizes certain municipalities to levy a municipal special sales tax, to provide that if a municipality levying such a tax fails to comply with certain audit or reporting requirements and does not remedy the noncompliance within 30 days after receiving written notice of noncompliance, the Department of Revenue will withhold payments otherwise payable to the municipality under this section until the department receives written notice that the municipality has complied with such requirements.

[House Bill 1170](#) amends Section 63-21-16 to authorize the Department of Revenue to issue electronic liens and titles for motor vehicles and manufactured homes. If there are one or more liens or encumbrances on the motor vehicle or manufactured home, the Department of Revenue may electronically transmit the lien to the first lienholder and notify the first lienholder of any additional liens. Subsequent lien satisfactions may be electronically transmitted to the Department of Revenue and will include the name and address of the person satisfying the lien. When electronic transmission of liens and lien satisfactions is used, a certificate of title does not need to be issued until the last lien is satisfied and a clear certificate of title is issued to the owner of the motor vehicle or manufactured home. When a motor vehicle is subject to an electronic lien, the certificate of title for the motor vehicle will be considered to be physically held by the lienholder for purposes of compliance with state or federal odometer disclosure requirements. A duly certified copy of the Department of Revenue's electronic record of the lien will be admissible in any civil, criminal, or administrative proceeding in this state as evidence of the existence of the lien.

[House Bill 1671](#) amends Section 27-7-22.43, which authorizes an income tax credit, insurance premium tax credit and ad valorem tax credit for voluntary cash contributions made by certain taxpayers to eligible charitable organizations. The tax credit is available only to a taxpayer who is a business enterprise engaged in commercial, industrial or professional activities and operating as a corporation, limited liability company, partnership or sole proprietorship. Under the prior law, the ad valorem tax credit was available to such taxpayers not operating as corporations. The bill provides that the ad valorem tax credit is also available to taxpayers operating as corporations.

[Senate Bill 2700](#) provides full homestead exemption for unremarried surviving spouse of U.S. military member killed on active duty or training.

[Senate Bill 2703](#) amends Section 63-1-43 to require the Commissioner of Public Safety to waive the fee for any driver's license or learner's permit for applicants who are in the custody of the Department of Child Protection Services. The bill also amends Section 45-1-21 to exempt applicants in Child Protection Services custody from the card stock fee for a license, permit or identification card bearing the applicant's likeness.

[Senate Bill 2841](#) amends Sections 27-19-31 and 27-19-11 to provide that an owner of a private carrier of passengers, of a motorcycle, or of a carrier of property whose gross vehicle weight does not exceed 10,000 pounds may choose a regular license tag with a black background and a white pinstripe border, with "Mississippi" printed at the top and the name of the county printed at the bottom. The bill prescribes an additional fee of \$38.25 for the issuance of this tag. Of this fee, \$2 will be deposited into the Department of Revenue License Tag Acquisition Fund created in Section 27-19-179, and the remaining \$36.25 will be deposited into the Law Enforcement Officers and Fire Fighters Death Benefits Trust Fund created in Section 45-2-1.

[Senate Bill 2862](#) exempts sales of precious metal coins, gold, and bullion from sales tax.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

[House Bill 588](#) amends Section 71-5-353 to create the Mississippi Office of Workforce Development Fund in the State Treasury, which shall consist of funds collected from the Mississippi Office of Workforce Development contributions and any other monies that may be appropriated to it from the Legislature.

WILDLIFE, FISHERIES AND PARKS

[House Bill 979](#) allows a licensed hunter to pursue in the night or after legal hunting hours, a deer that was wounded during legal hunting hours, using a flashlight and up to two tracking dogs, and dispatch the wounded animal with a pistol of 45-caliber or smaller.

[Senate Bill 2534](#) creates additional regulation of fishing guides and outfitters and creates a license fee.

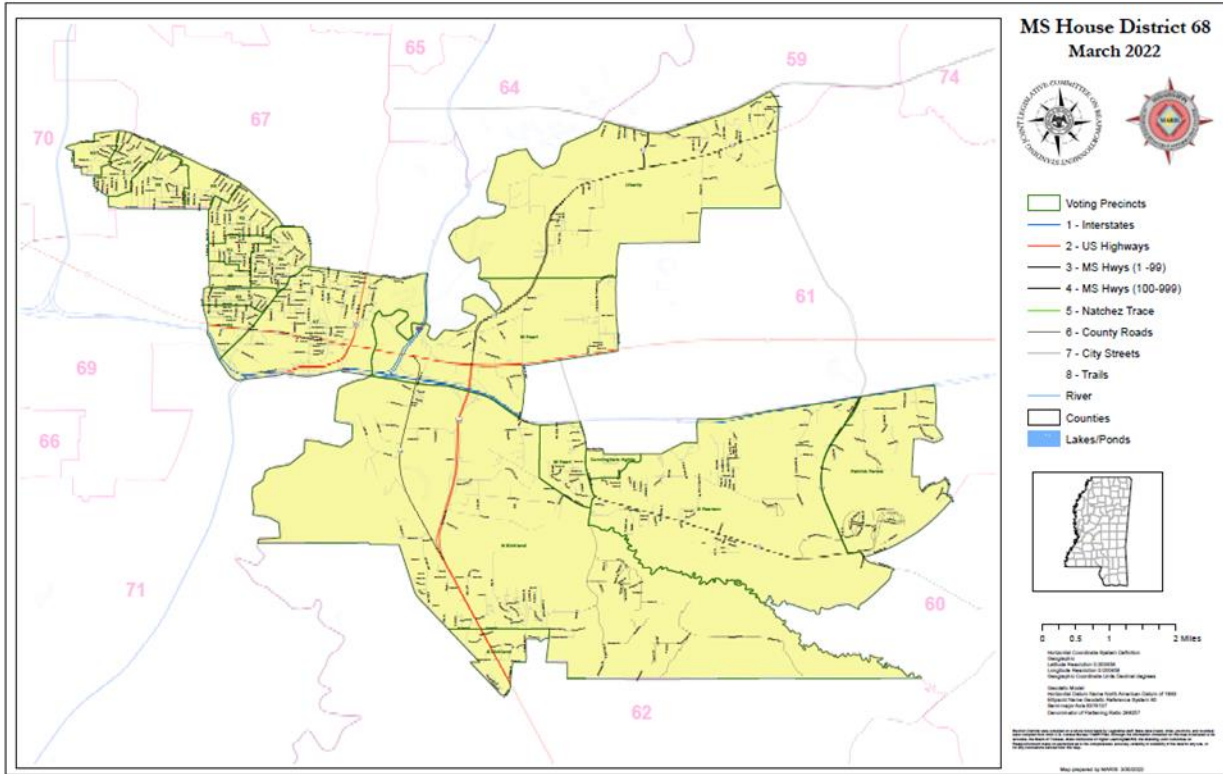
